Delegates handle numerous business items

The delegate body handled numerous business items during the 2024 Annual Conference. Moderator Madalyn Metzger presided over the Conference, assisted by moderator-elect Dava Hensley and secretary David Shumate.

Review and Evaluation Committee: A mandate and an extension of term of service were approved for the next Review and Evaluation Committee. A new Review and Evaluation Committee is called in the fifth year of each decade to evaluate the organizational structure and procedures of the Church of the Brethren. The committee's term was extended from two years to up to four years at the recommendation of the Standing Committee of district delegates, which foresees that in this time in the life of the denomination such evaluation may require more time. The five-member committee, chosen from at-large members of the church, will be elected by Annual Conference in 2025 and will have until 2029 to bring back a report and recommendations.

Query: A New Model of Denominational Structure: The concern of this query, brought by Miami (Fla.) Haitian Church of the Brethren and Atlantic Southeast District, was referred to the Review and Evaluation Committee.

Among other things, it notes "serious conflict and division around issues of human sexuality and biblical authority" and asks how a new model of denominational structure may give hope to those who are contemplating separation from the Church of the Brethren. The query was characterized as speaking on behalf of the multicultural sector of the church. It sparked much discussion at the microphones including appreciation for the focus on "how" and for the Haitian Brethren bringing the query, and anticipation of an opportunity to work in a more structural way toward becoming a truly multicultural denomination. Ouestions about it included its assumption that inclusiveness with regard to sexuality and ability to be a multicultural church are opposing values. In pre-Conference meetings of Standing Committee, the moderator explained that potential outcomes of the query include districts shifting from being geographically based to being theologically aligned.

Breaking Down Barriers—
Increasing Access to Denominational
Events: This study committee was granted another year to complete its work, including a feasibility study.

Memorandum of Understanding with Bethany Seminary: This interim measure was approved, updating the seminary's polity regarding its board of trustees pending approval of a new agency covenant that is being developed.

Polity of On Earth Peace: Approval was given to a temporary revision of the agency's internal polity as an interim measure until a new agency covenant is finalized. The revision updates bylaws to meet diversity commitments.

Standing with People of Color: This committee is two thirds of the way through its three-year mandate to collaborate and develop materials for congregational, district, and denominational use. It was formed in response to a 2022 query from Southern Ohio and Kentucky District. Annual Conference directed the response to be a collaboration of the district with On Earth Peace and staff of the Church of the Brethren including the director of Intercultural Ministries.

Calling Denominational Leadership: This study committee presented an interim report, shared some of its findings, and received comments and input during the Conference. Issues around the calling of leadership are many and it has become increasingly difficult to get enough nominees for the Conference ballot.

Pastoral Compensation and Benefits Advisory Committee recommendations: Two recommendations were approved by the delegates including the annual cost of living adjustment to the minimum cash salary table for pastors, which was set at 3.3

percent for 2025, and revisions to the pastor's Housing Equity Fund. The latter shifts the fund from a mutual fund account to a qualified church retirement account held by Eder Financial. The savings fund enables pastors living in parsonages to purchase their own homes after leaving the parsonage.

Special Response Process: The Standing Committee, which is tasked with reviewing the Special Response Process intended to help the denomination work through strongly controversial issues, asked the Conference officers to bring names for a task team to carry out the review.

Anniversaries: Anniversary celebrations included the 300th anniversary of Germantown (Pa.) Church of the Brethren as the oldest Brethren congregation in the Americas; the 80th anniversary of Heifer International, which got its start as the Church of the Brethren's Heifer Project; and the 45th anniversary of the Death Row Support Project.

General secretary signs alobal Christian letter

eneral secretary David Steele was one of more than 200 Christian leaders from around the world who signed a public letter in advance of the address to Congress by Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu on July 24.

"As global Christian leaders committed to peace and justice and the recognition of the image of God in all humanity, we abhor the ongoing violence that has now continued for more than nine months between Hamas and the Israeli military," the opening paragraph said, in part. "More than 1,100 people were killed by the Hamas

attacks on October 7th, and mass killings by the Israeli military in Gaza have taken more than 39,000 lives. More than two-thirds of Gaza... have been destroyed or rendered uninhabitable. Not only the livelihoods but even the wherewithal to maintain the most basic subsistence of two million people has been erased. Children are dying of malnutrition, credible reports indicate prisoners are being tortured, and efforts to release the hostages are not being prioritized. These atrocities stain the conscience of all humanity, and in this, we include ourselves as Christian leaders and the global church."

The letter continued with calls for a permanent ceasefire, return of hostages, release of Palestinian prisoners held without due process, immediate access for humanitarian response in Gaza, an end to arms flows into the conflict zone, and prevention of the spread of violence in the region, among other measures.

It also delineated the threat the conflict poses for continued existence of Christianity in the Holy Land, saying, in part: "We fear the existential threat to the Christian presence in Israel and the occupied Palestinian territories-the very place where our faith tradition began."

Mission and Ministry Board sets 2025 budget parameter

he Mission and Ministry Board set the 2025 budget parameter for the Church of the Brethren's Core Ministries during a pre-Annual Conference meeting in Grand Rapids, Mich., on July 3. Chair Colin Scott led the meeting, assisted by chair-elect Kathy Mack and general secretary David Steele.

The 2025 budget parameter for the Core Ministries was approved at \$5.13 million in income and \$5.66 million in expense. This parameter was recommended by the Executive Committee, with a couple of changes to the original parameter proposed by staff. The revised parameter includes, among other things, an increase in the cost-of-living adjustment for employee salary and benefits from the proposed I percent to 2.5 percent, and changing the use of designated funds from \$481,000 to \$0. There is an anticipated 7 percent increase for employee medical insurance. In approving the revised parameter-which is based on 10-year giving trends as well as investment transfers-the board also approved a significant budget deficit of \$529,000, which is to be addressed by the Executive Committee between now and the fall board meeting.

In other business:

The board received a financial update for current year 2024 from treasurer Ed Woolf.

The Strategic Planning Committee received approval for a recommendation intended to enhance the direct linkage between the four "pillars" of the strategic plan and denominational ministries, through infusing communications with the language of the strategic plan and encouraging more direct advocacy by board members and staff. 


